Albert Addison Youngs 1891 - 1950

Albert A. Youngs. (Sidney Center correspondent)

Albert A. Youngs, highly respected retired farmer, and a former town of Sidney superintendent of highways, died Monday evening, June 26, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Gordon Morse, at Delmar, where he and his wife went to reside a few months after he was stricken with an illness from which he never recovered.

He was a son of George R. and Corlinda Gifford Youngs and for many years lived on the Youngs homestead farm about three miles from Sidney Center.

Besides the above named daughter, Mr. Youngs is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ethel (Palmer) Youngs; his mother, Mrs. Corlinda Youngs of Johnson City, and two sisters, Mrs. John Robinson of Johnston City and Mrs. Annabel Long of Ithaca.

The body was taken to the Harold Sherman funeral chapel, Bainbridge, where funeral services were held at 2 Thursday afternoon, June 29. Rev. George Youngs of Athens, Pa., officiated. Interment was made at Unadilla.

Albert E. Youngs 1837 - March 17, 1918

[This obit is from a typed copy in Philinda Youngs Long's family.

Albert ran a creamery and two or three farms near Youngs. Albert E. Youngs purchased in the spring of 1868 a farm of 100 acres ("mostly woods") on the Masonville Unadilla road (later known as Youngs Hill) from Geo. Simpson. When Albert retired to Sidney Center to a house on main street by the RR trestle, his son Frank purchased the family farm.]

Albert Youngs of Sidney Center, N.Y. was suddenly stricken with valvular heart failure, while attending Epworth League service [young persons' meeting] in the Methodist Church. Mr. Youngs had been in his usual good health. He had attended church service in the morning, visited with guests in his home during the afternoon and in the evening went to the young people's meeting.

He gave a beautiful testimony, talking on the subject of the evening "making the most of one's life", and in closing, expressed his strong faith in guidance of a higher power. In his closing remarks his voice grew very faint. As he stopped speaking, he lost consciousness and within a few minutes, he had entered into the great beyond. It was an abrupt but beautiful ending to a long and useful life.

Mr. Youngs was born in Unadilla on April 27, 1837. On December 25th 1861 [Nov. 6, 1861, per family history], he married Miss Armenia Spencer Wait, who died about two months ago. They began housekeeping in Unadilla Center, and four years later moved to Youngs Station, where they lived till twenty-three years ago. When they moved to Sidney Center [ca. 1895], Mr. Youngs was a fine singer, and in his younger days taught singing school in this locality.

He was a man of forceful personality, with a strong will yet he had a tender heart and a keen sense of humor. He was a very successful farmer and a man of keen intellect. He liked to argue and talk on topics of the day. He was a great public speaker and during the years that the Progressive Literary Union flourished in our village [Sidney Center], he was one of the most active and valued members. He was blessed during his long life with splendid health and an optimistic nature. Probably no man in the community has enjoyed life more intensely than Mr. Youngs.

He has made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Mary Simpson since the death of his devoted wife.

The family have the sincere sympathy of the community in their loss of a father who was ever their companion and friend as well as a kind and loving parent.

Surviving him are five children: G. Reno Youngs, Mrs. Mary Simpson, Mrs. Arthur Rutenber of Sidney Center, Mr. Frank Youngs of Youngs Station and Mrs. L.R. Long of New Kingston; also twenty-six grand children, all of whom will treasure his memory.

The funeral was held from his daughter's home and from the Methodist Church on Thursday afternoon. The Rev. A.H. Landmescer [Landmesser] assisted by Rev. L.R. Long of New Kibgst [Kingston] officiating interment in Highland Cemetery.

Albert Young [Albert E. Youngs; this article was published Friday, March 22, 1918 in Margaretville in the weekly Catskill Mountain News.]

Dropped Dead - Father of Mrs. L. R. Long Expired at Church Service Sunday Evening

Albert Young, father of Mrs. L. R. Long of New Kingston, dropped dead in Epworth League meeting at Sidney Center Sunday evening.

Apparently in his usual health, which was remarkably vigorous for a man of his age, he had attended all the services of the church on Sunday and in the Epworth League meeting had just given an unusually inspiring testimony, when, as he resumed his seat, his head fell back and death came almost instantly. The coroner gave valvular heart disease as the cause of death.

Mr. Young was nearly 81 years of age, having been born in the town of Unadilla April 27, 1837. On Nov. 6, 1861, he was married to Miss Armenia Wait of Unadilla Center. Their married life of over 56 years had mostly been spent on a farm at Youngs and in Sidney Center, where they had lived for 23 years. Her death occurred about two months ago. He is survived by five children, 26 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. The funeral was held yesterday at 1 o'clock from the Methodist Episcopal church, Rev. Arthur Landmesser, assisted by Rev. L. R. Long, of New Kingston, a son-in-law of the deceased.

George Reno Youngs 1862 - 1939

George and Corlinda bought a farm and built their house outside the village of Sidney Center on the road to Sidney.]

It is with deep regret that Sidney Center and other friends of George Reno Youngs heard of his death which occurred at his home Monday, Sept. 4, at 6:30 a. m. from paralysis of the heart. He had been ill since the previous Saturday morning.

Mr. Youngs spent his entire life in the vicinity of Sidney Center and his sterling character, recognized by all, was perhaps most deeply noted in the Methodist church which has been enriched by his loyal devotion through a life-time of service.

Born at Unadilla Center Sept. 23, 1862, and the oldest of the five children of Albert and Armenia Waite Youngs. His death marks in the family chain of five the first broken link. When Mr. Youngs was three years old the family moved to the farm home at Youngs, now occupied by [George's] son, Albert Youngs.

On Oct. 30, 1889, Mr. Youngs was united in marriage to Miss Corlinda Gifford of East Masonville, who has been a loyal helpmate. [It is noted elsewhere that he was secretary and treasurer of the Farmers and Patrons Fire Insurance Association organized by his father-in-law William A. Gifford. By 1935, depression era barn fires put it out of business.]

The funeral service was conducted from his late home Wednesday at 2 p.m. Rev. S. E. Hung, retired minister of Unadilla and former pastor of the Sidney Center M.E. church, officiated. Rev. T. K. Emerson, pastor of the Baptist church, offered prayer. John Edwin Price sang "Over There."

Mrs. Philinda Y. Long 90, widow of Hon. Lincoln R. Long, school principal, Methodist minister, Member of Assembly, writer, died at the Margaretville hospital on Saturday after a short illness. Mr. Long died in 1927.

Mrs. Long was born in Unadilla, Oct. 26, 1864. Her maiden name was Philinda Youngs. She spent nearly her entire life in Delaware county and had lived in several townships, as the family had moved from one town to another because of the positions held by her husband.

She was a devoted wife, the mother of five children. She joined the Methodist church when young and had been steadfast in its religion all her years. She had taken an active part in various church organizations. She was highly respected by her neighbors.

with their families. The children are as follows: Mrs. Courtney [Ethel] Sanford, Margaretville; Mrs. Hale [Ruth] Elliott, Newington, Va.; Mrs. James [Marion] Elliott, New Kingston; Mrs. Alex H. [Marguerite] Suter, Roxbury; and Frank Long, New Kingston. There are 16 grandchildren and the same number of great-grandchildren. Mrs. Arthur [Alice] Rutehnbur [Rutenber], a sister, and Frank Youngs, a brother, both of Sidney Center, also survive.

Her funeral was held at the Herrick funeral home in this village on Tuesday at 1:30. Interment was beside her late husband in the family plot in the Margaretville cemetery. Rev. Eugene Crabb officiated. He was assisted by Rev. Dilly of New York, a relative. Bearers were grandsons. There were many relatives present at the funeral from this county and from far away.

William James Young 1821 - 1883

[The obituary is from a transcribed copy taken from The Sidney Record, April 5, 1883. It was told in the family that he lived in the big house on the corner at Youngs.]

William J Young Carr's Creek Delaware County, NY [October 1, 1891 the post office name changed from Carr's Creek to Youngs, NY.]

The subject of the above sketch was born at Otsdawa, Otsego Co., N.Y., Nov. 11, 1821, and departed this life at Carr's Creek, N.Y., March 11th, 1883, aged 61 years and 4 months. He acquired a good academic education, and at the age of sixteen years, began to teach school, and taught for twenty-four terms.

In October, 1843, Mr. Young married Polly J. Taylor, who died Nov. 24th, 1859; he again married in March, 1860 to Mary J. Snyder, who now survives him.

He moved to Sidney nearly forty years ago and resided in this town to the day of his death, with the exception of one year and a half that he lived in Walton. Farming has been his chief occupation, and the buildings he erected on his farm are reckoned among the nicest and best in town.

He embarked in the mercantile business for a few years, beginning in 1871.

Mr. Young was an active member of the M.E. Church for nearly forty-five years, and took an active part in the dissemination of the Gospel. He was instrumental in starting the Carr's Creek Sunday school, of which he was Superintendent at the time of his death, leaving it in its present most flourishing condition.

Mr. Young retained the results of his early education throughout life, and gathered a

large quantity of valuable works, of which he left a large library. He was a kind father, and a devoted husband, and in his death, the community feels the loss of a good neighbor and worthy citizen.

Essie M. Dicks Young 1861 - 1881

[Her husband James W. Young was the son of William James Young above. The below obituary appeared as four pages (including cover) from The Model Print, Carrs Creek, N.Y. 1881. The 4th page, not transcribed, was: Lines written on hearing of the death of Mrs. Essie M. Young. By Rev. E. White. Bloomville May 25th. 1881.]

Mrs. Essie M. Young

Essie M. wife of James W. Young of Carrs Creek, and daughter of J. & C. A. Dicks of Walton, was born at Walton Del. Co. N.Y. June 3d, 1861, she was delicately constituted; yet she possessed those rare mental qualities, an amible [sic] and cheerful disposition and an even temperament, winning for her the respect and friendship of all who knew her, and making her the especial favorite of those with whom she was intimately acquainted, always willing to add to the enjoyment of others. She was one of those rare beings, who, through-out their existence make life to those around them a pleasure rather than a burdon. She was a faithful and affectionate daughter, a kind and loving sister, and to her associates a pleasant and agreable companion.

She was married at Walton Oct. 8th, 1879 and soon after removed with her husband to his home at Carrs Creek, where with every prospect of a happy life before them. For one year and a half, they lived in the quiet enjoyment of each others society, the ties between them being made doubly strong by the birth of a son, another comfort added to an already happy house-hold. But often upon the brightest and farest morning a cloud will arise, and soon the wife and mother was taken suddenly ill. Partialy recovering in a short time, she returned to her former home in Walton to visit her friends thinking perhaps the change would be beneficial to her health.

Shortly after reaching home she was stricken with "brain fever" from which she never recovered. Although she received the best medical aid that could be procured for her assistance, with the untiring care of her husband whom she always seemed to want near her. And of her father and mother and sister it became evident after three weeks of great suffering, that Death had marked its victim. And on wed. May 11 th, 1881 she fell asleep in "JESUS" never on earth to awake; Aged 19 years 11 mo. and 8 days. The funeral obsequies were held on the following Friday at the 1 st. M. E. Church of Walton Rev. W. A. Chadwick delivering the address, the remains were then removed by rail to Carrs Creek for interment.

The inhabitants of that place, were assembled at the depot upon the arrival of the train to pay their last respects to one: who, during her short stay among them, had

gained their highest esteem and friendship. A procession was then formed and the body borne gently to the cemetery: where, after closing ceremonies it was consigned to its last resting place "beneath the sod".

The deceased was a member of the M. E. Church and a meek and faithful follower of "Christ". Her light was not that which dazzles for a moment, and then fades away, but was that which shines with an unfading luster growing brighter and brighter until the perfect day.

During life she manifested a great love for the "Holy Scriptures" having read the Bible through by course nearly four times, an unsual occurrence for one of her age; and in her last sickness she would not be separated from them, but always kept the Bible near her, reading in it as long as able, and when unable longer to do so requesting others to read to her from its "holy pages".

It seemed that one so pure and good ought always to have remained with us. But we know that "GOD is geod", and that "HE doeth all things well".

Her untiring endeavors in behalf of her husband and child (an infant of nine months) while yet living, make her loss more keenly felt.

The afflicted husband and the family of the deceased have the unreserved sympathy of all.

Death has rarely taken from our midst one whose loss has been so deeply regreted, or whose memory will be so dearly cherished:

Yet we are comforted by the assurance that while we are mourning, she is with the redeemed above, rejoicing and praising "GOD" in the land where sorrow and pain shall never come. L. L.

[L. L. might be Lincoln L. Long who later in 1885 married Philinda Youngs (whose obituary is above) when he was at Youngs Station for his first teaching position. Lincoln's older brother Eben and his wife had come to Carr's creek (as it was then called) after their April 1881 marriage.]
